FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends.

Sunday, October 7th is World Communion Sunday, celebrating our oneness in Christ with Christian brothers and sisters all around the world. World Communion Sunday was first celebrated at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA in 1930 when Shadyside's pastor, Dr. Hugh Thompson Kerr, served as moderator of the General Assembly. Dr. Kerr and his staff wanted to bring churches together to understand the connections that those who follow Christ share. Though the celebration of World Communion Sunday was adopted by the denomination in 1936, it wasn't until the years during and immediately following the Second World War that the idea caught on and began to spread to churches all over the world. People recovering from the ravages of war began to realize that the way to hold together is to celebrate what binds us together as brothers and sisters in Christ, our unity around the Lord's Table.

The website Ministry Matters says, "The key word for World Communion Sunday is communion, or unity. It is a day when we mark the almost universal Christian practice of breaking bread with one another and remembering both the night of Jesus' betrayal—when Jesus instituted what we now call the Lord's Supper as a lasting remembrance—and of Jesus' sacrifice." So on World Communion Sunday we celebrate the Lord's Supper, the primary way Christians remember both our Lord's sacrifice for us and our unity around the Table. "World Communion Sunday is a time for remembering that around the globe—in different languages, with different traditions and customs, and in various forms of liturgy—the Lord's Supper is celebrated throughout Christendom."

When we emphasize unity, we say that worshipping and fellowshipping together is one of the most important aspects of our faith, because the church IS the body of Christ in the world today. "There is no substitute for living around other Christians," write Stanley Hauerwas and William Willimon of Duke Divinity School. A "primary way of learning to be disciples is by being in contact with others who are disciples" (Resident Aliens: Life in the Christian Colony). We grow in discipleship as we strive with others to hear God's Word, feed the hungry, welcome strangers and love one another. It's with our brothers and sisters in faith that we experience the presence of Christ and learn through our successes and our failures what it is to live the life of faith – how our faith works, to use the theme we've been exploring in worship these last weeks.

This month we are privileged to host the Fall meeting of the Presbytery of Yukon – the biannual gathering of pastors and elders representing churches from all around Alaska. We will worship and eat together and feast at the Lord's Table, hearing the gospel in Korean and Inupiat Eskimo, Siberian Yupik and English. We'll see visible evidence of our unity in Christ as well as the work we still need to do to attain that unity. Hosting Presbytery is a lot of work, and I know many of you are already working hard to prepare for the gathering. It also takes a lot of faith that all our plans and preparations will go smoothly, our guests will be fed and housed and that the presbytery will accomplish the work that is before us.

One of the most powerful witnesses to me of community and communion is seeing our congregation come together in faith to do the work God gives us. You all demonstrate the strength of your faith every day in big and small ways. It's a blessing to see your faith at work and to work with you as we serve our community, our presbytery and our world.
