You may not see many changes in the Church this week, but things keep happening. Our biggest news is the request we sent to seven companies asking them to be fixing the uneven floor (mainly the area under the Sunday School room hall). We expect this could cost up to \$30,000, most of which will be paid for by our insurance and FEMA. We hope to pick a contractor next month and have work done in January.

Have you seen the possible designs for the new grand door into the Sanctuary? There are drawings in the narthex. Let us know what you think, which one looks best to you? You can leave notes on the back of the drawings. Our color and flooring committee has submitted their choices. The samples they chose are in the administrative office if you want an advance peek.

FROM THE PASTOR:

For everything there is a season and a time for every matter under heaven. Ecclesiastes 3:1

Time and space are the canvas God has prepared for our lives to mature and unfold. 

- What you need:
 - 1/4 cup maple syrup
 - 1 tsp. pumpkin pie spice
- 1/8 tsp. salt
- ²/₃ cup pecan pieces
- 1/3 cup roasted pumpkin seeds
- 1/3 cup almonds
- 1/4 cup raisins
 2/3 cup dried fruit (any)

What you do:

- Microwave syrup, spices, seeds and nuts for 30 seconds at a time, stirring frequently, until mixture thickens.
- Spread the mixture on a baking sheet lined with wax paper. Let cool and harden.
- 3. Break the candied nuts into chunks. Combine with dried fruit.
- 4. Store in airtight container.
